## Competition Commission "Fighting Bid-rigging Cartels" Educational Video – Subtitles

## Preventing

Voice-over:	This is no ordinary box! It symbolizes a fair selection process that ensures consumers can obtain better products and services at better
Voice-over:	prices. We bidders could control the prices and results ourselves! Cheating? So what? It has always been this way!
Voice-over:	Times have changed!
Voice-over:	The Competition Ordinance is already in full force! It is illegal for competitors to rig bids and the Commission will combat bid-rigging cartels head-on!
Voice-over:	So today we have invited Mr. Lee to share some tips on how to tackle bid-rigging!
Voice-over:	The best way to win is to follow Sun Tzu's advice in <i>Art of War</i> : to know oneself and one's enemies. Let's take a look!
Voice-over:	So how should we play it this time?
Voice-over:	Just say you require 90% payment upon contract confirmation.
Voice-over:	Don't worry! I'll make sure you get some juicy subcontracts if I win the bid!
Voice-over:	Ha, ha, ha
Voice-over:	The footage was adapted from a case with information provided by a leniency applicant.
Voice-over:	Which one in the video is the whistleblower?
Voice-over:	The identity of whistleblowers is confidential!
Voice-over:	How can we spot bid-riggers?
Voice-over:	These are signs we can look for. Here are four tell-tale signs.
Voice-over:	First, beware of tender documents from different bidders using the same wordings, typefaces and formats, or with the same typographical errors and miscalculations!
Voice-over:	Second, see if the winning bidder subcontracts work to the losing companies every time.
Voice-over:	Third, look for any suspicious pricing patterns such as a bidder that bids relatively high in some tenders but then relatively low in other similar tenders.
Voice-over:	Fourth, they often make last minute changes and may even withdraw their bid suddenly.
Voice-over:	It's a free market! We can do nothing if a bidder chooses to opt out all of a sudden.
Voice-over:	That's true! But as procurement officers who are responsible for tendering, you can draw up rules of the games. Here are four rules for your reference. Let's check them out!
Voice-over:	Which one makes bid-rigging harder?
Voice-over:	The one on the left. The greater the number of bidders participate in the tender, the tougher it will be for bid-riggers to get to work! It will be more difficult for them to communicate and get everyone on board.

Voice-over:	Good! Rule number 1 is to invite as many potential bidders as possible.
Voice-over:	Rule number 2 is eliminating possible communications among bidders by not letting them know who else is invited to bid. For example, you should avoid inviting potential bidders to attend a briefing at the same time.
Voice-over:	How can we get more bids?
Voice-over:	Good question! Rule number 3 is to avoid unnecessary restrictions and minimize the cost of bidding to increase the number of qualified bidders.
Voice-over:	Should we require people to submit bids on a line item basis or a lump sum basis?
	I know. The answer is the left one! The more details we ask for, the easier we'll spot bid-riggers.
Voice-over:	Excellent! The more items are available for comparison, the tougher it will be to rig bids.
Voice-over:	We should make it clear in our tender documents that lump sum bids will not be accepted. When necessary, seek advice from a credible independent consultant.
Voice-over:	But be careful, consultants may be close to the bidders, make sure they act in your interest. If it is a very large tender, consider hiring a second consultant to audit their work before awarding the tender.
Voice-over:	My fellow procurement officers, we must learn the rules and be smart. We need to know the market and always stay alert. Bid-rigging is now illegal under the Competition Ordinance. We are no longer powerless, we can report to the Competition Commission.
Voice-over:	You may also include a warning in your next tender invitation
Voice-over:	Suspected bid-rigging will be reported to the Competition Commission for further investigation.
Voice-over:	You may even require the bidders to sign an undertaking that they will not participate in bid-rigging.
Voice-over:	While the Competition Commission will do all it can to combat bid- rigging cartels, procurement officers should also safeguard competition.
Voice-over:	Always stay alert and improve the tendering procedures. Do not give cartel members a chance to succeed. If you suspect bid-rigging, report it to the Competition Commission now.
